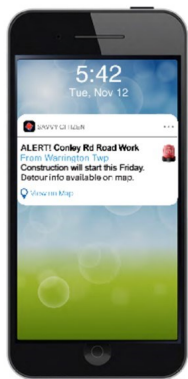

So what is a township?

Seems like a simple question. When asked where you live or filling out forms or applications, how often do we say I live in Warrington Township? Most often we answer Dillsburg, Wellsville, Dover or Lewisberry, our respective post offices. Often, the township is only thought of as that place where we send our taxes, have to visit to get a permit or where that snowplow truck comes from. What exactly is Warrington Township?

Townships were created by Pennsylvania and in the case of Warrington, we were created in 1744 many years before the founding of the United States. Back in the 18th century, travel was difficult, communications were slow so there needed to be a government close to the people to provide basic services. For nearly 200 years, townships like Warrington provided basic services such as the maintenance of roadways and bridges. Townships were very rural and most residents of Pennsylvania lived in the larger cities such as York and Harrisburg and townships were sparsely populated. But as society became more mobile and communications advanced, people were now able to live in areas far removed from the traditional urban areas and suburbs began to encroach into rural areas and as we all know this continues to this day. Many can now work from home and live anywhere they want.

HISTORY OF WARRINGTON TOWNSHIP

TOWNSHIP (CONTINUED)

Because of this expansion of population, the services expected today from Townships such as Warrington now reaches well beyond roads and bridges. Today, Townships provide a range of services such as parks and recreation, planning and zoning, funding fire protection, permitting, code enforcement, etc. Even the simple idea of maintaining roads and bridges has become more complex and expensive with snow and ice removal, traffic signals, signing, storm water management, safety improvements, bridge safety inspections and construction and maintenance trucks and equipment.

Warrington Township is what the state designates as a Second Class Township (Second Class means rural, not status) which is governed by state law. The state regulates and delegates certain powers and responsibilities to townships. Since the state dictates the power of townships, townships such as Warrington, every action taken by the township, must conform to a state law. Many things that Warrington Township must do by state law comes with little or no state funding and is the reason why we must collect taxes and fees. We have all heard of the phrase "unfunded mandates"!

Warrington Township is led by an elected 5 member Board of Supervisors whose main focus is to ensure public safety, plan for our future land uses and other activities important to our residents. The Board of Supervisors is responsible for the enactment and enforcement of ordinances and resolutions, the levying of taxes, implementing state mandates (think mandatory septic tank pumping) and management of employees that deliver services to residents in the most innovative, efficient and cost-effective manner possible. Other elected township officials include a tax collector and auditors.

The success of a township is not just about elected officials, commissions, boards and employees. A successful township needs active and engaged residents willing to participate in the process. We need people to participate on boards and commissions, run for township elected office, help the local fire company, attend public meetings and voice opinions and ideas. Most important, vote in the primary and general elections! In many respects, the township is the government closest to the people and has the most impact on our daily lives.
